

# ABC Secretary/Treasurer's Report

## Bruce Gregg ABC# 003

We now have 153 members in our Aluminum Bottle CANnoisseurs Chapter. Two (2) new members joined in August before Convention and 32 joined at Convention. In the month of October we have had 4 additional collectors join ABC. To date we have given out 154 ABC #'s and one member has passed away. New members and renewals to date total 75. The balance of members, totaling 78, need to send in their renewal dues as soon as possible. See directions in the next paragraph for renewals.

Our group continues to grow at a good rate. The stats show the following growth:

### Renewal Dues Policy and Rates:

Those ABC members who joined within the first 12 months of ABC operations (the period 5/07 through 4/08) owe \$5 Renewal Dues to be paid by 10/31/08. Please send to Bruce Gregg, ABC #003. This applies to members with ABC #'s from 001 to 107 plus #113 and the \$5 dues will cover a one (1) year period until 10/1/09.

Those ABC members joining between 5/08 through 9/08 are considered paid until 10/1/09. No additional payment will be required for ABC members with #'s from 108 to 117 until next year's renewals that will begin in 10/09. Members with numbers 118 through 154 are new members and are paid until 10/1/09.

Postal service mail deliveries of the Cabottle Times within North America now require an additional \$10 per year charge for printing and postage. Deliveries outside North America will be billed at a level to cover printing and postage to the point of delivery. (This could get expensive and is not the preferred choice for members or the ABC club.)

### ABC Chapter Meeting 8/29/08:

- Motion made to fund an ABC Chapter web site passed unanimously.
- Motion to raise the cost of hard copy mail deliveries within North America to \$10 per year passed with a nearly unanimous vote.
- Motion to raise hard copy mail deliveries outside North America to an amount to cover actual costs to the country of delivery passed unanimously.
- Motion made to permanently retire Don Hicks' ABC #002 in his honor passed unanimously.
- Tobi Hicks ABC #005 replaced Don Hicks ABC #002 as ABC Vice President by previous ABC Board motion.
- Motion made to reinstate all ABC officers and board members for an additional year passed unanimously.
- In general, all members present expressed a desire to try to keep Cabottle prices down.
- John Kinnard ABC #009 has completed a spread sheet listing of US Cabottles and provided this to BCCA for placement on the BCCA web site. John has now started drafting a USBC style photo listing of US Cabottles with mandates that will also be displayed on the BCCA web site.

I believe that covers the news of the day from the Secretary Treasurers point of view. Best to all in your aluminum bottle collecting.

# Astros Bottle Adventure

Last year, I traveled to Houston to attend an Astros game in hopes of collecting some of the aluminum Astros bottles for my collection. The trip was a success, and I was happy with what I was able to get. At the end of the game my girlfriend and I went through a section and collected all the bottles we could and put them in a big box I had brought with me. The clean-up crews even assisted us, as they were happy to have additional help in cleaning up after the game. It was a good game, and that experience led me to return this year with my girlfriend in hopes of collecting some of the new Astros bottles. Unfortunately, my experience this year would be much different.



Upon entering the park, I noticed right away a big change. They had special recycling bins set up just for these aluminum bottles. These were large and shaped like an actual bottle, and would be impossible to get into to retrieve any bottles without taking the entire lid off. I also noticed that there seemed to be several ushers monitoring these bins every few minutes to make sure the lids were still securely attached. I commented to my girlfriend that this seemed odd, and she agreed.

We headed to our seats, and throughout the game I purchased seven of the bottles and placed them in a big box I had brought. I figured that after the game, my girlfriend and I could do as we

did last year, and collect the bottles from the empty seats as people left. So, after the game we started to go through the rows, placing the bottles in my box as we went along. After a short time of doing this, an usher told us that we couldn't do that here. I interpreted that as meaning "not in this section," as they were preparing for a fireworks display. We moved to another section, and in a few moments an angry supervisor came up behind me and snatched the box I was holding away from me. He said we needed to leave the stadium right away, or he was going to call security. I told him that I had purchased seven of the bottles, and I was going to need those back. He allowed me to do so, but still accused me of taking more than just the seven. He then proceeded to escort my girlfriend and I towards the exit.

I tried to apologize for the misunderstanding, but he wouldn't listen. I asked if my girlfriend could use the restroom before we left, and he said that would be fine. He stood with me while I was waiting for her to get done in the restroom, so I decided to ask him what the problem was. He said that you can't take anything out of the stadium that you didn't pay for. He also asked, "How would you like to drink out of a glass that had been puked in?" I had no idea what he was talking about as I wasn't collecting glasses, nor was I going to touch anything that had puke in it...let alone drink from it. What I did realize is that Minute Maid Park didn't want me to potentially sell something from the park that I got for free, and by the reaction of this supervisor, I guess it is the biggest concern of the Houston Astros.

After reflecting on this event, I have come up with a simple solution for the Houston Astros. If people collecting items like drink cups and aluminum bottles is such a huge concern, why not just distribute generic cups and bottles with no logos? Then you wouldn't have to hire some red-faced, short-tempered usher to keep his watchful eye on someone like me who is quietly collecting garbage from the seats.



# The Cartersville Connection

## Steve 'Boomer' Blume ABC# 013

Making 16oz. aluminum bottles in the Cartersville, Georgia brewery takes 6 people. On the afternoon shift it all starts with Mike Smithson. Mike is responsible for running the depal. This consists of driving a double forklift. He loads the new glass on the line which is unstacked and sent to the uncaser.



Waiting there is Erica Potter. She makes sure the bottles make it out of the cases and on the line to be sent to the filler.



Once at the filler, Byron Johnson makes sure all bottles are filled properly. The bottles then make their way through the pasteurizer where it is heated and then cooled. This is the process that kills any bacteria and gives beer shelf life.



Next the bottles exit the pasteurizer and head to the labeler where 30 year Anheuser Busch employee Nancy Pouley is waiting. Nancy started in 1978 at the Tampa Brewery. With the aluminum bottles graphics no label is needed, but Nancy makes certain of quality issues and also is responsible for the laser code being applied. This code lets us know where and when a bottle was made. This is important to know if any consumer complaints arise.

Next the bottles make their way to the packers. Arvis Messer is waiting there to make sure bottles are packaged properly. Filtecs along the way make sure bottles are filled to specification and the proper number of bottles get put in each case. All jobs along the way are important, but Arvis works his butt off every day. He must keep the packers running so the line never backs up and stops the filler. Keeping the filler running is the most important part of the job, along with quality and safety.

After the cases of bottles leave the packers they are sent to the warehouse where Larry Ginn (no photo available) is responsible for putting away finished pallets or loading them directly on to trucks for shipping.

There are three 8 hour shifts doing the same job. I have focused on 3<sup>rd</sup>. shift, or afternoons because this is the shift I work. It takes focus and dedication to run the line. These 6 employees help us to enjoy the aluminum bottles we get at our local stores. They are important to our club as collectors of these bottles.

To thank them for their fine work each of the 6 were awarded a \$20 gas card. Paid for with money raised at CANvention 38 in Orlando, Florida. We at the BCCA, especially Chapter 169 "The Aluminum Bottle CANnoisseurs" would like to thank all employees at the Cartersville, Ga. Brewery as well as the Baldwinsville, N.Y. brewery. These are the only two breweries that produce Cabottles at this point.

Keep up the good work and keep the bottles coming. We love drinking them as well as collecting them. We hope all involved with the process will join the BCCA, and gain free membership in our club the 1<sup>st</sup>. year. Line 40....."THIS BUD'S FOR YOU"

# Aluminum Soda Bottles

Just when you think things can't get any crazier.... This is just in from ABC Member John Krupnik regarding the very mysterious Mountain Dew "7<sup>th</sup> bottle." Dubbed the 7<sup>th</sup>, because in the recent Green Label Art series of 6 new bottle designs, a 7<sup>th</sup> began showing up on ebay. Here is the story from John

It's still playing out, but there are 3 large groups of skull bottles out there. Pepsi (The owners of Mountain Dew) still has most of them (The first batch) and wanted to keep the value high so they could give them away at special events (Magic Show in Las Vegas, Comic Book show in San Diego, etc.) Pepsi would set up a booth and have the artist "Pushead" sign the bottles. Pushead does the Skull-Art for many T-Shirts and album covers for hard rock bands including all of Metallica's covers. He has quite a 'cult' following and has even done several action figures designs that bring hundreds of dollars each.

Anyway, an executive from Pepsi had a hundred or so of these bottles (the second batch) and was out of the loop (with the keep them valuable deal) and gave his to a friend who started selling them on ebay for \$300 to \$400.00 ea. Then the ebay seller wanted to unload the remainder quickly and started putting up 10 bottles at a time in an auction listing. Pepsi got wind of this and shut the seller down. The Pepsi executive got in big trouble for giving them away.

In the meantime, Pushead was pissed that his loyal fans were not getting any bottles unless they would go to a Pepsi booth at a show or pay through the wazzo for one on ebay. (ebay is the only place you can buy these). So Pushead made a move with his inventory (The third batch) and sells over a 100 on ebay for \$40 ea. I bought one and tried to buy another only to find out that he has set a limit of one per customer. I tried to talk him out of ten more but he wouldn't bite. I had a few friends buy some more for me, but the bottle is so cool they all want to keep their bottle for themselves.

But it is a minor back panel variation of the zillion 2008 Concrete Dragons so not very valuable.

Thanks John for the story. I had also heard that each Pepsi Distributor received one of the 7<sup>th</sup> bottles in a special sleeve package as a Thank You from Pepsi. Some of these have made it to ebay also.

There are 35 different Mountain Dew aluminum bottles. There are about 40 different Coke, and 20 or so Pepsi and Diet Pepsi that I know of. Last word that I have heard is that Pepsi is not going to do any more give-aways at shows but, like most of the above email I have only second-hand information except for my personal dealings with Pushead.

All this has transpired in less than a month and is still playing out. The most valuable MDs will be the one's signed by the artist. I also have in my collection a signed "Paper Tiger" (Previous Green Label Art series bottle) from the artist. The rarest MD is the 13th green label art bottle from 2007 - "Concrete Dragon".




# Cabottle Go-With's






